Choral tribute to D-Day

Gosport schools were among those singing on a special choral tribute to the heroes of D-Day.

The 200 pupils were recorded in St Mary's Church, Rowner, as part of our Cathedral Sing outreach programme, which takes music into local schools. They came from Siskin Primary, Rowner Junior, Grange Junior and Peel Common Junior Schools.

Their voices will be heard on the new CD entitled Heroes' Tide, which has been produced to raise funds for the transformation of Portsmouth's D-Day Museum.

Two Portsmouth Cathedral choirs, Portsmouth Choral Union, Solent Male Voice Choir and the Milton Glee Club Choir are among the other choral groups recorded for the CD.

The tracks include We'll Meet Again, Do Not Stand at my Grave and Weep by Howard Goodall, and an arrangement of When I Survey the Wondrous Cross.

The CD also includes the

premiere of a reflective piece entitled Heroes' Tide by James Dunlop, a Royal Marines musician.

sung by the It is Portsmouth Massed Choir, which was inspired by the events surrounding the 70th anniversary of D-Day and brings together more than 300 singers and musicians.

They were recorded live at Portsmouth Guildhall earlier in the autumn. The other choirs involved were also recorded at the same event, when D-Day veterans spoke of their experiences between breaks in recording.

The rector of Rowner, Canon John Draper, said: "The town and people of Gosport played a vital part in the D-Day landings, as many troops left the shores of Gosport for northern France in June 1944.

"It is entirely appropriate that the four junior schools of Rowner should use Rowner Parish Church as their recording base. The church is the spiritual home of so many servicemen and women today. We were privileged to host the event."

The Cathedral Sing outreach

workshops and community events for children and teachers in primary schools, delivered by leaders and members of Portsmouth Cathedral Choirs across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight.

It engages thousands of children each year, and highlights the potential of music to explore other elements of the primary school curriculum.

And the £4.9m project to transform the D-Day Museum in Southsea aims to create a radical new layout that use the most up-to-date display methods, to continue to tell the story of turning point of the Second World War.

The idea is to fully convey the scale and drama of the largest seaborne invasion in history, and the human side of the story, seizing the last opportunity to capture the firsthand experiences of the men and women who took part. The work is due for completion in mid-2017.
