## Easter visit for childre

CHILDREN from Horndean school had a chance to sample what Easter is all about - with a visit to their local church.

ONE of our clergy represented our diocese at Lambeth Palace for the launch of a new Church of England initiative.

The Rev Jonathan Jeffery, who is vicar of Leigh Park and also chaplain to Pompey Football Club, attended with representatives of all 29 southern dioceses in the Church of England.

Former England defender Stuart Pearce and former Pompey legend Linvoy Primus were also there.

The Archbishop of Canterbury backed the work being done through the launch of the C of E Sports Ministry initiative. The Most Rev Justin Welby, who has made evangelism and witness a priority for his ministry, said that evangelism is "not a survival strategy for the church, it is integral to being a Christian."
