Six walkers covered the whole distance, with others joining them for a day or part of a day along the way.

Around 30 people walked together on Saturday from Liphook Church Centre to St Peter's Church, Petersfield, wth lunch at St Mary's, Liss.

Around 20 travelled from Petersfield to Rowlands Castle on the Sunday, pausing for services in Buriton and Idsworth churches.

And 14 made the final trip from St Faith's Church, Havant, along the shore of Langstone Harbour to our
