Bishop to celebrate church's 50 years

BISHOP Christopher will help a church in Havant to mark its 50th anniversary this month.

St Alban's Church in West Leigh will mark five decades since it was first built with a Celebration Eucharist.

It happens at 3pm on Saturday 16 July, which is the actual anniversary of the church's dedication.

The vicar, Canon Karina Green, said: "The church was built 50 years ago to be a Christian witness to the people who were moving out to West Leigh, into the new post-war housing. There was originally a church on St Alban's Road, an old tin hut, before the present church was built.

"It is built in a Scandinavian style, so has a warmth and light feel to it. The hall offers good facilities to several groups and as a venue for the local community.

'The service will be a time to give thanks for the people who have been part of the St Alban's community, those who have been baptised or married at the church, for events and activities and for the worshipping life of the church."

Previous clergy and worshippers have been invited. and the afternoon will conclude with a traditional English afternoon tea.
