ONE important thing that happened during 2015 was the creation of our diocese's new strategic vision.

We agreed to commit ourselves to live, pray and serve: live as disciples of Christ, pray both individually and as congregations, and serve our local neighbourhoods and our world.

To achieve this, our diocesan staff are now geared towards helping parishes, church schools and chaplaincies as they aim to deepen people's grow discipleship; our churches; equip people for lifelong learning; and promote the transformation of society.

These priorities prompted our diocese to move forward in several important ways in 2015.

Pioneer ministry become an important strand of

our work, employing strategic clergy and lay people as ministers devoted specifically to reach

those who don't tend to come to church. Their pioneering work may involve finding new ways to pray and worship that may appeal to such people more than traditional church models.

Creating congregation in the heart of Portsmouth was another development in our mission.

Harbour Church was conceived as a church plant from St Peter's, Brighton, with a young congregation that might appeal specifically to students and other young adults.


During 2015, we asked the national C of E to help fund both the creation of four new pioneer minister posts, and the new Harbour Church, It involved a significant investment from our diocese, which we asked the Church Commissioners to match.

Our strategic vision also fitted in with the national Church's agenda of Reform and Renewal, which was also outlined during 2015.

It includes an emphasis on church growth and discipleship,

with strands looking at how we simplify church red tape; how we train our

ministers; how we target national Church funding more effectively; how we develop real disciples; and how we promote visionary leadership in the Church.
