Baptism drama marks real fait

THESE children and the front of church during that young people marked their commitment to God, by being baptised in the most dramatic way.

Five of them were fully immersed in the water in two baptism services organised by St Jude's Church, Southsea.

Chloe Bacon, aged 8 and her sister Abigail, 6, were baptised in a baptismal pool outside the church after a morning service last month, with crowds of congregation members gathered round them.

The vicar, the Rev Mike Duff, plunged both of them under the water three times as he baptised them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

The pair had spoken from

morning's service about the reality of their own personal faith.

When asked why she wanted to be baptised, Abigail said: "Well, Jesus was baptised. And I want to be part of God's family.'

And Chloe said: "Because I want to follow Jesus and learn more about him.'

A week later, congregation members gathered at the seafront near the Blue Reef Aquarium to see three more siblings declare their faith in God.

Ellie Bolton, aged 15, Alex, 12 and Annabel, 9, were baptised in the sea by Mike Duff and the church's curate the Rev Adam Denley.

Curious passers-by watched



as the baptismal party waded into the sea in wet suits and each lowered under the water three times, signifying their new lives in Christ.

All three subsequently talked in church about their decision to mark their personal Christian faith by opting for baptism by immersion.

"These children and young people are from church families where the parents waited until the children were old enough to profess faith for themselves before bringing them for baptism," said Mike.

"It was an absolute joy to hear them speak about their faith, and delightful to be part of services where we could formally welcome them into




