CATHEDRAL: The nave of our cathedral was brimming over at the seams as people flocked to see the sell-out performances of T S Eliot's play Murder in the Cathedral.

The rarely-performed play features the killing of our cathedral's patron saint, Thomas a Becket, on the steps of Canterbury Cathedral in 1170.

The Southsea Shakespeare Actors (SSA) joined members of the cathedral congregation to bring these dramatic events to life.

Patric Howe played Thomas with a sensitive touch that contrasted with the brutality of the murder. Residentiary Canon Peter Leonard, who played the part of a priest, was enthusiastic about the opportunities to set the play within the nave and choir of the cathedral.

Director Lauren
Farnhill said: "It was a
challenge and exciting
to work within such an
atmospheric space. I
hope this project will
be the first of many
dramatic collaborations
between the SSA and the
cathedral."

She dedicated the production to the memory of Dr Colin White, chair of the SSA, director of the Royal Naval Museum and server at our cathedral, who had always intended to stage the play there.

LEE-ON-SOLENT: A project that helps people with an affordable mode of transport around Leeon-Solent has made a

further improvement.

ICANGO is a partnership between St Faith's Church, Lee on Solent, and Gosport Voluntary Action to provide transport for those who are elderly, poor, disabled or living in isolated areas. The scheme now operates three mini-buses and is about to take delivery of a new bus donated by the Hampshire Community Transport scheme.

Because of the vulnerability of the clientele, ICANGO has

The Very Rev

the church. The centre
and right-hand lancets
were restored, and the
left-hand lancet and
three trefoils cleaned,
thanks to an energetic
fundraising drive.

A vintage tea party was also held at the church to mark not just the patronal festival, but also Isle of Wight Day. Visitors enjoyed tea in the sunshine and browsed the produce and craft stalls.
