

in a Muslim family in Albania, but started to date a man who wasn't a Muslim.

Her family weren't happy with the relationship, so the couple decided to travel to France to get married. However, in Belgium Jela became separated from her fiance, and the other Albanians she was travelling with became unfriendly.

They forced her to work as a prostitute in France for three months. Then she was brought to the UK on the back of a lorry.

She and three other women were kept under guard in a house in London. Every day, men paid her traffickers to have sex with Jela.

One day while travelling, she managed to escape and flagged down a policeman. Jela was referred to the Salvation Army, and was sent to a safe house, ill, pregnant and traumatised.

She received counselling, legal advice and healthcare, and gave birth to a baby daughter there.

AIMS TO TACKLE MODERN SLAVERY

THE national Church of England has recently launched a threeyear project to help dioceses in the detection of modern-day slavery, and to help support those who are victims.

The Clewer Initiative was launched in autumn 2016 and will continue until 2019. Its project officer Caroline Virgo was one of the speakers at our training day on modern slavery last month.

Our diocese is now also a member of the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Modern Slavery Partnership. It aims to implement the government's strategy on modern slavery, which identifies the important part that faith groups can play in supporting this initiative.
