In April we welcomed Sofia Backsten and Lars Lifvendahl, curates from the Diocese of Stockholm, to parishes here, as two of our curates - Max **Cross from Sheet and Janet Trevithick from Titchfield – set** off to Sweden. The purpose was to learn from each other and see how our shared faith is expressed by the Church of **England and the Church of** 

We are often so much more comfortable in own small corner of the Kingdom where we can enjoy the security of our own church tradition. When we feel safe and secure, we find it much easier to make our mark and pronounce the last word on the issues we face. The Church in Sweden and the Church of England are very different, and what has been most important has been the value of listening to other Christians who because of tradition and culture do things differently.

In election time our politicians love to have the last word. On TV or radio they

want to plant their strongly held beliefs in the mind of the viewer or listener. For Christians it should be different.

Det sista ordet, or the last word, demands of Christians that we speak and listen with generosity, that we aim to listen and to learn from others who are seeking to follow the way of Christ and do so in different circumstances.

During their time in the parishes of Titchfield and Sheet, Sofia and Lars experienced many aspects of English parish life and compared our church, which thrives on the volunteering work of many, with their own parishes, which are able to employ many more than we do. They were struck by the extent of different forms of lay ministry and the ways in

which we train clergy. When Sofia and Lars came to see me on the Isle of Wight we saw how Christians are involved the hospice, hospital chaplaincies and prisons.

We visited churches and communities and even went bowling and played crazy golf on Sandown Pier! In every aspect of their visit there were questions to ask that helped us all to grow. Rarely did anyone take the risk of trying to have the last word as to the right way in which our faith is lived.

At a time when there are so many arguments and divisive issues to face we should approach the delicate territory of making det sista ordet or the last word with the generosity of being as willing to listen as we are to speak.
