growing Church

CLERGY and lay leaders from 39 of our parishes will take part in a three-day conference this month on church growth.

Leading Your Church Into Growth (LYCIG) will happen from October 19-21 at the Old Thorns Hotel in Liphook.

More than 100 delegates will learn about the strategy behind church growth, how to develop a culture of invitation and welcome, and how to share our stories to help people meet Jesus.

The sessions include input from the LYCIG team and exercises to help our parishes develop their vision further.

It's the second time our diocese has invited delegates to a residential LYCIG conference. A similar number of clergy and lay leaders attended a conference in October last year. Across both conferences, 80 per cent of our benefices will be represented.

Last year's delegates continued the work with their own congregations, applying the principles via sessions called LYCIG Local. They were also invited to a series of follow-up sessions. The latest of those is happening on October 6 from 7.30pm-9pm, and is repeated on October 7 at 10am-2pm, both at St Jude's Church, Southsea.

The church's Harvest Festival service on October 1 includes the chance to give donations of dried and tinned food that will be shared between the Waterlooville Foodbank and the Sunday Suppers for the homeless at St Simon's Church, Southsea.

During the celebration year, the church has committed itself to praying for every household in their parish. Cards are posted through letter boxes in different

streets each week, inviting people to send their prayer requests to church. Then each Sunday, those prayers are included in the morning service.

Anglican minister the Rev Kate Macfarlane said: "This year has been a great opportunity for us to raise the profile of Hart Plain

Church in our local community and we've been pleased to welcome many people to our special events.

"We're looking forward to welcoming both old and new friends to join us for our anniversary weekend in December and are committed to continuing to serve our community for many years to come."

Hart Plain Church began in the 1960s when some members of Purbrook Methodist Church started holding services in a local school to serve the growing housing development in the north of Waterlooville.

They were then joined by members of St Wilfrid's C of E Church in Cowplain. In 1964, a site for a new church was secured and building work started in 1967.

The new church was opened on Advent Sunday 1967, and has continued ever since as a Local Ecumenical Partnership of Anglicans and Methodists serving the community of Hart Plain.
