As soon as St Barnabas opened up again for private prayer in June 2020, I popped in to thank God for answering prayers about my father, who had been in hospital with Covid. I had missed being there, and I had missed the church community during that lockdown. I had watched the vicar, Claire, as she led online services, but being there myself was a different experience.

I'm proud of everything St Barnabas does in the community, from the interaction in the local primary school to the innovative ways of connecting with the community via the St Barnabas coffee shop, the drive-in services they organised during lockdown and much more.
