The Edmonton area covers about 120 churches across 100 parishes of the London boroughs of Camden, Barnet, Haringey and Enfield. In addition, I also oversee the 'Growing Younger' priority across the Diocese, and the work of ALMA, (Angola, London, Mozambique Association).

I have spent the last 23 years in London in four different areas. It's a wonderful treat to see a different part of God's kingdom, and already I feel I am learning loads. As someone with some seaside roots, it is wonderful to smell the sea when I am in God's beloved diocese of Portsmouth. Thank you for your welcome, and I rejoice at the opportunity to minister alongside you all.
