

Honour for stalwart

ROSEMARY Fairfax was honoured in the King's first New Year's Honours list with a British Empire Medal for her services to the cathedral and community.

She was Visitors and Education Officer at our cathedral from 1989-2013, teaching pupils about the building, its history and the Christian faith.

She led teams that organised art exhibitions in the cathedral and created annual interfaith days with the Al Mahdi mosque near Wickham. She has also led the cathedral's Flower Guild for decades, welcomed people to services for years as a sideperson, visits the bereaved in their own homes and is currently a deputy churchwarden.



New island archdeacon

BISHOP Jonathan has appointed the Rev Steve Daughtery as the new Archdeacon of the Isle of Wight. He was licensed for his new role in our cathedral at the end of January.

He will remain as the vicar of Holy Trinity, Bembridge, on a half-time basis, as well as serving the archdeaconry and diocese. He will hold day-today responsibility for the clergy and parishes of the Isle of Wight, as the most senior priest on the island.

Steve, 61, is married to Amanda and they have five grown-up children across the south-coast. He has been in ordained Anglican ministry for 31 years and previously worked in an investment bank.

WORSHIPPERS at Church of the Resurrection in Farlington planted trees as one way of showing their commitment to care for God's creation.

The 14 new saplings included young birch, rowan, hazel and hawthorn trees. The idea is to increase biodiversity on church land. The leader of Portsmouth City Council, ClIr Gerald Vernon-Jackson, planted the first of the trees. Both churches in Farlington parish have now received a bronze 'Eco-Church award' from charity A Rocha.
