Amanda Sim has learnt to appreciate diverse worship styles at our cathedral and St Wilfrid's, Cowplain - thanks to her son Christian

Who are you? Amanda Sim, a dental hygienist who is just about to start ordination training.

Which churches are you part of?

I initially came to faith in our cathedral, and went on placement to St Wilfrid's, Cowplain 18 months ago.

Why did you start going there?

My son Christian was at
Portsmouth Grammar
School and expressed
an interest in joining the
cathedral choir back in 2012.
I was an agnostic and came
from a family background that
used to laugh at Christians for
being weird. But I'd always had a
genuine interest.

I went to hear him sing and was amazed at how formal and how beautiful the worship was. I went to every service he sang at, and the pivotal moment came when I found Jesus during the sung liturgy on Good Friday 2013. I was blown away by David Price's setting of *The Passion*. From then, I was able to experience the presence of God each time I went.

Christian's faith was also

developing. He was baptised and we were confirmed together in 2015. I went on a 'Living Faith' course, and realised I felt called to ordination. Christian became head chorister in 2017, and - among other things - sang for the Queen in the Royal Albert Hall and preached at Evensong. He's now retired from the choir, but will join Cantate this autumn.

In 2018, I went on placement to St Wilfrid's Church in Cowplain, and discovered I also loved being there too!

What do you love about your churches?

When I go to the cathedral, I

always sit in the same place, and there is something about the beauty of the building, the tranquility and the music that gives me a spiritual regeneration.

The fact that it is so peaceful means that you can focus on God without any real distraction, and the connection to God is almost overwhelming. I always hear from God when I'm there.

St Wilfrid's has fed me in different ways. The first time I went, what hit me was that this was a real community centred on Jesus. They are at the centre of the Cowplain community, and are bringing people from outside the church to hear the gospel.

It's a busy, vibrant church, and the sense of belonging is wonderful. At the cathedral, I hear God, but at St Wilfrid's, I feel the presence of the Holy Spirit.

I can worship God during an informal service at St Wilfrid's with a more contemporary worship band. My spiritual home will always be the cathedral, but I feel very comfortable in them both.
