Due to Church re-ordering St Peter's **Pipe Organ** is available for sale or re-housing. The pipe organ came from Tonbridge School and was built by Paul Hale, formerly music teacher there and now retired Organist and Rector Chori at Southwell Minster, who wrote:

The instrument is by George Maidwell Holditch circa 1875 and started off life as a two-manual and pedal organ in Midhurst church Sussex. Bought for Tonbridge School (Music Department) in 1972 it was semi-installed and then re-built as a one-manual organ in 1977 by Paul Hale (who was on the staff there 1975-1982.)

The action is mechanical but an electric blower was fitted in 1977. The wind system dates from Paul Hale's work and was made by Grant, Degens & Bradbeer, famous for the 1969 organ in New College, Oxford.

The Sibthorpe organ is recorded in the National Pipe Organ register under reference R00964 and for whom it was surveyed in the years 2003 and 2004. It is an excellent instrument, which deserves to be properly maintained and tuned when it will give many more decades' service. The organ has been tuned on a regular basis.

<p>31. From King's College, Cambridge, John Skeaping Statues</p> <p>In 1955 John Skeaping completed three ecclesiastical figures from Nigerian Opepe wood for King's College, Cambridge. Skeaping's life sized figures of Christ, St. Nicholas and The Virgin Mary have a distinctly English medieval feel, each standing well over 6 feet tall and weighing half a tonne.</p> <p>At an unspecified point in the 1960s the sculptures were removed from the altar of King's College Chapel to make way for <i>Adoration of the Magi</i> (1634) by Peter Paul Rubens, presented to the Chapel by Alfred E. Allnatt in 1961. They were then relocated on temporary loan to Lincoln Cathedral.</p> <p>The King's College archive confirms the figures were returned from Lincoln to Cambridge. Records reveal there were large wooden statues being installed in the King's College Memorial Chapel towards the end of 1981. Since then the carvings have found their way into storage within a dilapidated barn on a site owned by King's College. In this environment the unpacked sculptures have suffered exposure to the elements, fluctuations in temperature and have attracted considerable surface debris and dust. As a result, the carvings need considerable cleaning, treatment to lateral cracks, discharge of glue from joints and small parts of the figures which have become detached over time. 34. St Raphael's church was endowed as a sailors' mission opening (unconsecrated) in 1859 with an adjoining almshouse. In consequence of the high ritual of the Revd. A.H. Ward the licence for divine service was withdrawn in 1878 and the church closed until 1893. Consecrated 30 May 1893, it was converted into the parish church of a new district created out of St.Paul, Bedminster by Order in Council 17 July 1893.

The church was destroyed by enemy action in 1940 and officially closed 23 June 1941. The parish area was then divided between St.Mary Redcliffe and Holy Trinity, Clifton by order in Council 20 April 1943. Most of the fittings from St Raphael's were taken to St Andrew's Church, Avonmouth, another 'sailors' church'.

With the potential re-ordering of St Andrew's in 2017, permission has been given to dispose of the **pulpit** originally from St Raphael. The design reflects the mariners' theme, having two columns made up of a variety of shells and motifs depicting the ships' prows. Given the controversial history of St Raphael's during which the church was closed for 15 years, it is highly likely that many well-known figures from the Oxford Movement and Ritualists spoke from this pulpit, often risking arrest.

41. Whatlington church is seeking a new home for its Victorian **oak pulpit** due to a major post fire restoration into which the pulpit no longer fits.

A large hexagonal oak pulpit made of oak with five of its side panels, including the door richly carved to represent The Good Shepherd and the Four Evangelists. The pulpit stands on a slender hexagonal pillar with a splayed oak top and base. Three large carved oak angels, Faith, Hope & Charity stand individually around the base, each having large splayed carved wings. The pulpit is accessed by an oak staircase radiating from the main body and which has an oak handrail. There is a seat in the pulpit and a small oak reading desk with a light.

Fully erected the pulpit stands 80 inches from the ground to the top of the main body and measures 44 inches across the 'tub'. The staircase adds a further 24 inches width to the assembly. Each angel stands approximately 36 inches high.

The pulpit is believed to have been made in France, to the design of Sussex clergyman Revd. J. A. Hatchard in the late 1850's or early 1860's and is mentioned erroneously by Nicklous Pevsner as having been shown at the Great Exhibition of 1851 at Crystal Palace.

Availability is subject to final Faculty approval, which stipulates 'A suitable home' for what is regarded as a notable piece of church furnishing. The pulpit will require some re-polishing due to water damage and work to make the assembly safe for use, but would make an impressive addition to the right location.
